

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

Many of you have served through mobilizations or voluntary extended orders here or in a deployed environment stateside or overseas.


All of you have participated and continue to do your part for our country. Your service was and is remarkable, and you should be proud of your accomplishments as I am proud of you.

Deployment exercise prepares wing for ORI

lmost 180 Airmen from 10 units of the .512th Airlift Wing participated in a deployment exercise Nov. 3-4 here.

The exercise, referred to as the DEPEX, evaluated wing Airmen's ability to process through a mobility line and marshal cargo as preparation for the Operational Readiness Inspection in July.

"The DEPEX reviewed not only the completeness of the individual's personnel folders and personal bags, but also examined units that move cargo, and how efficiently they got that cargo on the aircraft," said Lt. Col. James Johann, 512th AW performance manager. "Cargo needs to be processed at the same time as [Airmen] with the goal that the two meet up [on the aircraft] at relatively the same time, all this is involved in the grading criteria for initial response."

ORIs are conducted to evaluate and measure the ability of a unit to perform in wartime, according to Air Force Instruction 90-201, Inspector General Activities.

512th and 436th AW Airmen will take on this test, which evaluates four areas: initial response, employment, mission support, and the ability to survive and operate in a hostile environment, said Colonel Johann.

"Just because you haven't been tasked to participate in the ORI as a deployer doesn't mean you don't have a role in ensuring this wing's success," said Col. Randal L. Bright, 512th AW commander. "These tasked Airmen earn the grade for all of us so every Airman in this wing should be supporting this

exercise, whether it's assisting with training or ensuring Airmen have the proper equipment they need to do the mission."

moving cargo.

Initial response, assessed during the November DEPEX, evaluates the wing's ability to process through a mobility line, reviews Airmen's mobility folders, and examines the wing's ability to move cargo. Employment is getting to the deployed location and setting up work areas; and, mission support is Airmen successfully doing the jobs they were trained to do but in a combat environment. In addition to doing the job, Airmen must know how to survive and

operate in these harsh conditions. The ATSO portion of the ORI evaluates how well Airmen respond to force protection conditions, alarm conditions, Mission Oriented Protective Posture, or MOPP, levels and attacks. Airmen must also show proficiency in self aid and buddy care and measures concerning at the DEPEX, we have much post-attack hazards.

The November DEPEX, the first of several exercises the wing will undergo in the next six months, served as a starting I challenge everyone to keep point to evaluate what the wing needs to improve, said Colonel Johann.

planner said most mistakes occurred not in the area of cargo or personal bags, but personnel folders. Airmen were missing documents, had expired certifications, needed training, and some individuals were talking on cell phones while going through the mobility line, he added.

"We haven't done DEPEX and ATSO training in a while and there are a lot of areas that we can improve," said Colonel Johann. "Preparation is the key."

To hone 512th AW member's deployment and wartime skills the wing has exercises planned for the following months. ATSO training, referred to as the Haunted House and Battle Ax exercise, is scheduled during the January UTA. ORI players will under go another DEPEX, which is slated for the February UTA. And, the Operational Readiness Exercise is scheduled in April at Volk Field Air National Guard Base, Wis. The ORE serves as the mock tests evaluating all four areas and prepares 512th and 436th AW Airmen for the final exam—the ORI.

Colonel Johann also recommends that Airmen should work with their unit deployment manager to ensure all requirements are met and training has been accomplished according to the installation deployment plan. Also, the Airman's Manual contains information that is especially useful in the area of initial response and ATSO, he said.

"While we did perform well more practice ahead of us," said Colonel Johann. "The ORE and ORI are important to all of us and shouldn't be taken lightly. giving 100 percent. Dover has a strong team of Airmen and we have the chance to prove that The wing performance during the months to come."

Wing Airman earns combat action medal

712th Aircraft Maintenance Squadron shift supervisor is the first wing member to receive the Air Force Combat Action Medal for his actions in support of the Global War on Terrorism.

Master Sgt. Gerry La Chance earned the honor for his actions five years ago while assigned to the 436th Airlift Wing as a flying crew chief on a special operations mission.

The Air Reserve Technician retired from the Air Force in 2005 and joined the Air Force Reserve that same year under the active-duty retiree program.

In 2002, then Technical Sergeant La Chance was on a C-5 mission, flying classified equipment into Saddam International Airport, now Baghdad International Airport, Iraq. While much of that mission still remains classified, he said they were continuously fired upon while approaching the airfield. He relayed verbal instructions to the flight crew stating the type of fire, which was antiartillery, and the direction it was approaching from. The plane landed safely, and the crew was met by Army ground forces. Sergeant La Chance said he began to inspect the aircraft for damage and to assist with the download of equipment when he came under mortar attack and noticed small arms fire in the surrounding area. He reported the incoming munitions to the Army and directed where to return fire.

The main reason the medal recipient said he feels he earned this honor was for ensuring a safe approach by reporting oncoming fire and for notifying the Army of the location of the small arms fire, allowing them to engage the enemy and secure the area.

"I wasn't scared," he said. "It was more

adrenaline ... we train for situations like this."

Five years later, the technical sergeant said he read about the creation of and eligibility requirements to receive the Air Force Combat Action Medal. He asked the navigator and pilot on that mission to write a narrative of his combat role that day, he added. This statement was provided to his supervisor and routed through his chain of command that submitted him for the medal in June and was approved by U.S. Central Command in October.

"Master Sergeant La Chance's actions are just another example of the dedication and service that our MEGP (Mission Essential

Ground Personnel) and flight crews provide while routinely flying C-5 aircraft into hostile, austere locations worldwide," said Chief Master Sgt. William Eason, 512th Aircraft Maintenance Squadron maintenance superintendent.

Air Force Chief of Staff Gen. T. Michael Moseley authorized the creation of the medal March 15. The medal recognizes Airmen who engaged hostile forces in the air or on the ground in a combat zone.

Any Airman who believes they may be eligible for the medal can submit an award package for consideration. Airmen are eligible for the Air Force's newest decoration if their primary role includes performing duty in a combat zone, coming under fire or firing upon the enemy on the ground or from the air. A combat zone is a geographic area in which Airmen receive danger and hostile fire pay. In addition, a narrative explanation of an Airman's role in combat activities must be submitted by a person who witnessed the incident.

More cargo to be shipped through Dover AFB

SCOTT AIR FORCE BASE, III. -

Aerial port rebalancing efforts are underway to speed the delivery of cargo destined for warfighters deployed in support of Operations Iraqi Freedom and Enduring Freedom.

The proposed actions will also significantly reduce the overall cost of operations to the American taxpayer, said Air Mobility Command officials.

Beginning Jan. 1, most cargo destined for locations in the Central Command area of responsibility will shift from Charleston Air Force Base, S.C., to aerial ports at Dover AFB, Del., and McGuire AFB, N.J. Currently, the

Department of Defense contracts commercial trucks to transport cargo from northeast defense supply locations to Charleston, bypassing aerial ports at Dover and McGuire. Aircraft, some of which are based at Dover and McGuire, fly to Charleston, then upload and transport the cargo to troops deployed

After the first of the year, Dover and McGuire will become the primary aerial ports for channel cargo operations flying into the CENTCOM theater. In addition to reducing cargo movement time by 18 to 24 hours, these efforts are expected to save U.S. taxpayers more than \$40.3 million a year.

Charleston AFB remains an essential element in the nation's air cargo operations and will continue to provide vital support to deployed forces as the gateway for shipment of thousands of Mine-Resistant Ambush Protected vehicles, which are designed to protect troops from mines and improvised explosive devices, said AMC officials.

In addition, Charleston's aerial port is essential in sustaining current and emerging operations in South America and Africa. Charleston will continue operations as the largest C-17 base in AMC. (Courtesy AMC Public Affairs)

Humor and lost change aside, 2007 proved to be a year of transformation for the

Humor and lost change aside, 2007 proved to be a year of transformation for the Liberty Wing, ranging from new leadership to a new mission.

The year kicked off with the anticipation of the C-17 Globemaster III. To prepare for its arrival, the 512th Maintenance Group reorganized Feb. 4 and activated the 712th Aircraft Maintenance Squadron, which assumed the C-17 maintenance mission.

The 326th Airlift Squadron took their final C-5 flight March 10, converted to the C-17 mission April 1, and formally welcomed the first C-17, the Spirit of the Constitution, June 4. The next day, the 326th AS began a new era of airlift at Dover Air Force Base taking the first flight, a local training mission. The base welcomed six more C-17s throughout the year, the sixth aircraft arriving Nov. 9 and the seventh is slated to arrive Dec. 3. Dover is scheduled to receive six more C-17s in 2008.

It was also a year of hails and farewells.
The base welcomed several new
commanders. Col. Randal L. Bright assumed
leadership of the 512th Airlift Wing June

9 from Col. Ronald A. Rutland, who took a position with 22nd Air Force and retired Sept. 8. Col. Steven Harrison took command of the 436th AW May 8 from Col. Sam Cox who transferred to the Pentagon.

Chief Master Sgt. Caroline V. Vennell, former 512th Airlift Wing command chief, retired March 10 and passed the torch to Chief Master Sgt. William T. Wild III, 512th Security Forces Squadron.

This summer, the wing also said farewell to the 512th MXG Commander Col. Willie W. Cooper II, who moved to Pope Air Force Base, N.C. Col. Alan H. Lerner took the group's reigns upon his arrival from Willow Grove Air Reserve Station, Pa. He was one of several 913th Airlift Wing members to transfer to the Liberty Wing as Willow Grove Air Reserve Station, Pa., prepares to close. The 512th Aerospace Medicine Squadron wasn't left untouched. Col. Walton F. Reddish took command of the squadron upon Col. Jeffrey Hilovsky's retirement.

A new mission and leadership were not the year's only highlights. The Air Force celebrated 60 years of air power, announced the creation of the Airman's Creed, a new medal, and updates to uniform wear policies and enlisted and officer performance reports. In April, Air Force Chief of Staff Gen. T. Michael Moseley announced the creation of the Airman's Creed, which exhibits the Air Force heritage and warfighting ethos. That same month, Air Force officials announced the creation of the AF Combat Action Medal, and the CSAF presented the first medals in June to six Airmen, one of which was a reservist. In November, Tech. Sgt. Gerry La Chance, a 712th AMXS shift supervisor, was the Liberty Wing's first recipient of this medal.

In August, Air Force officials announced the mandatory wear date of November 2011 for the Airman Battle Uniform; and, Air Force Reserve officials revealed their plans for Air Reserve Technicians to wear military uniforms while working in civilian status.

The AF also changed the physical fitness test standards to pass or fail, eliminating the "marginal" category. AF officials also revealed new EPRs and OPRs, which incorporated fewer lines and a section to document annual fitness scores.

August also saw hundreds of 512th Airmen take on Ability to Survive and Operate training, and in November, wing members participated in a deployment exercise in preparation for the Operational Readiness Inspection in July 2008.

2007 saw the 46th Aerial Port Squadron

move into their new facility in October; and, in November Air Mobility Command officials announced beginning Jan. 1, most cargo destined for locations in the Central Command area of responsibility will shift from Charleston AFB, S.C., to aerial ports here and at McGuire AFB, N.J.

However, it wasn't a year of all work and no play. On Sept. 15, nearly 700 members of Team Dover celebrated the AF's 60th Birthday, with a 'Heritage to Horizons' Ball held at Dover Downs. The AF was founded Sept. 18, 1947.

November kicked off with great news as well. AMC officials announced Nov. 2 that Dover AFB outperformed Travis AFB, Calif., and Charleston AFB, S.C., in the AMC Commander in Chief's Installation Excellence Award and rewarded Dover \$100,000 for quality-of-life projects.

Overall, it's been a year of exciting and historic events, and this year in review summarized, many but not all, of 2007's highlights. The New Year will usher in its own share of new challenges, one of which is preparing for the July 2008 ORI. And, once again, Liberty Wing members will prove true to the wing's vision that we are ready with unrivaled Airmen and global airlift for freedom's defense.

GI Mail safer way to stay in touch

Global Internet Mail is a personal e-mail program available to all servicemembers that can be used from any computer with Internet access, including government systems.

While official government e-mail accounts are the most secure form of e-mail communication, messages sent between GI Mail accounts are more secure than those sent between public e-mail accounts.

"GI Mail offers an added layer of 'protection' to military service members and is the Department of Defense preferred alternative to commercial e-mail services," said Master Sgt. Jeffery Bricker, 52nd Fighter Wing Operations Security program manager.

Commercial e-mail services, such as Yahoo, Hotmail and AOL are outside of the DoD's control, and the confidentiality of forwarded e-mails cannot be guaranteed. GI Mail is the only DoD-approved morale Web mail service.

"These services are hosted on non-Air Force systems and could be compromised without the knowledge of military users," Sergeant Bricker said. "On the other hand, GI Mail offers similar services and functionality as commercial programs but with the advantage of being placed inside the government network behind a firewall at Scott Air Force Base, Ill."

GI mail is also available to spouses who are registered in the Defense Eligibility Enrollment Reporting System.

"When deployed down range government computers can not be used to access yahoo, hotmail or AOL, so GI Mail is the perfect solution," Sergeant Bricker said. "Spouses are able to communicate on a much safer system and know it is much less likely that their e-mails are getting into the wrong hands."

Driven by technology, vPC-GR adding 'Dashboard'

DENVER -- An enhancement to the reports and initiate any additional transactions virtual Personnel Center - Guard and Reserve scheduled to launch in December will put Airmen in the Air National Guard and the Air Force Reserve in the driver's seat of their to complete the coordination process. personnel transactions.

The new vPC-GR Dashboard will streamline the way they manage their vPC-GR account profiles, submit new requests, check the status and coordinate on existing transactions.

"We're trying to make vPC-GR more efficient for everyone," said Lt. Col. Doug Ottinger, director of the Air Reserve Personnel Center's directorate of future operations and integration. "The Dashboard will allow people to complete all their coordination actions at once, with one log on."

Since 2006, vPC-GR has enabled more than 25,000 online transactions for retirements and decorations to be routed through coordinators, reviewers or approving officials. In the past, coordinators would receive an e-mail for every transaction requiring their review and would have to log in and log out for each.

The Dashboard, on the other hand, enables the coordinators, reviewers and approving officials to process a transaction, monitor its progress, attach related documents, develop under one logon.

The vPC-GR Dashboard also will reduce the number of e-mail notifications needed Coordinators, reviewers and approval officials

will have the ability to choose to receive one e-mail a day or none.

"With the old system, commanders coming in for their UTA weekend could be faced with hundreds of emails just for vPC-GR transactions,'

Colonel Ottinger said. "Many of our customers found the number of e-mails generated by every request excessive. Now they decide how many they receive. That's good news."

When an Airman sets up a vPC-GR account profile, the system will default to send a notification e-mail to the member when he or she has pending actions. Airmen who don't want to receive the e-mail notification can

uncheck the appropriate box. Those who select the option are responsible for checking their Dashboard frequently for pending actions.

Another Dashboard feature allows Airmen to eliminate processing delays by delegating that responsibility or role to someone else in

> their organization. If a primary person has delegated his or her role to another, it cannot be further delegated to someone else. The primary can release the delegated role by designating an expiration date or deleting it after returning to duty.

The Dashboard structure will affect coordination on existing vPC-GR retirements and applications for awards and decorations. No health assessment, no pay

Reservists who do not complete their Reserve Component Periodic Health Assessment will be medically profiled, which means they are not eligible to deploy or receive pay or points. Reservists have five months prior to their birth month in which to complete the assessment. As part of this assessment, reservists are required to have an annual dental examination. Every third year the annual dental exam is completed by a military dentist. During the two intervening years a dental exam is to be performed by a civilian dentist at the member's expense. The results of the dental exam are to be recorded on Department of Defense Form 2813 and returned to the 512th Aerospace Medicine Squadron.

Base decals now outional at Dover AFB

Drivers at Dover Air Force Base now have the option to display Department of Defense decals on their vehicles.

Motorcycle operators will still need to comply with base safety standards and have required training before being allowed to ride on AF installations.

To gain access onto the installation, Security Forces will require the operator/passengers to present valid military or civilian

employee identification. The Air Force discontinued all POV vehicle registration in March. The expense and administrative burden are not justified by the benefits. In Fiscal Year 2004 and 2005, the Air Force spent approximately \$364,000 and \$738,000 respectively to print Department of Defense Form 2220s. On a typical AF installation, registration requires about 15 minutes per vehicle. The AF currently has 1.66 million registered vehicles, each requiring renewal at least every three years.

ALCF member receives top honors

aster Sgt. Adam Black, affiliation manager of the 512th Airlift Control Flight here, having already been named ALCF Senior NCO of the Year by Air Force Reserve Command, has gained two more distinguished awards.

Sergeant Black was named the 22nd Air Force Senior NCO of the Year for Contingency Response Elements and Air Mobility Command Contingency Response Element Performer of the Year for the Air Force Reserve Command.

"People don't receive these awards without superior people around them," said Sergeant Black. "These awards could and would have gone to five or six other people had they been nominated."

A few of Sergeant Black's accomplishments include deploying as the mission support team chief to Lehigh International Airport, Allentown ,Pa., and conducting the site survey in support of the U.S. Navy Research and Development. Their mission was to airlift a new ship hull design, which had a one-inch clearance on either side of the hull and the cargo compartment of a C-5. He also lead a program that taught 1,125 U.S. Navy, Army and Marine active duty, Reserve and National Guard members during eight AMC Affiliation Program training classes in six locations with a 99 percent pass rate.

Along with his military accomplishments, Sergeant Black has been active in his community. He generously donates his time and services as a golf professional to underprivileged children through the nationally recognized First Tee program, which teaches kids basic skills of the game and collects donated golf equipment.

"I think what separates Master Sgt. Black from his peers is his

versatility. Adam's AFSC [Air Force Speciality Code] tells you he's a C-5 loadmaster, but he's so much more for us here in the ALCF," said Maj. Russell Carlisle, 512th ALCF commander.

The commander said Sergeant Black solely manages a \$600,000 budget as the AMC affiliation program manager, a program that teaches units from all service branches how to prepare their equipment for deployment. Sergeant Black is also the contingency response team chief,


