Super Galaxy

Team Dover ushered in a new era of airlift as we welcomed the arrival of our first C-5M Super Galaxy to Dover Feb. 9. We had the honor of having Gen. Arthur J. Lichte, Air Mobility Command commander, deliver our new strategic airlifter. Attending the ceremony were all three of our Delaware Congressional Delegation as well as Lt. Gen. Charles E. Stenner Jr., Air Force Reserve Command commander and Chief of the Air Force Reserve. We welcomed the Spirit of Global Reach with much deserved pageantry, as it will provide

new airlift capabilities for the Air Force. This is a faster, stronger and safer aircraft, which truly lives up to its title: Super Galaxy.

By the end of February we will have acquired our second C-5M. Our air and maintenance crews will be well into the Operational Test and Evaluation process for validating the Reliability Enhancement and Re-engining Program for the C-5Bs. This September, we are scheduled to receive our third C-5M, completing the surge process of the OT&E. Within a couple of years, we will have all of our C-5s converted to Super Galaxies. This is a historic time for Team Dover and this added

Upcoming Inspections

We are down to the wire for our upcoming inspections April 23 to 28. The wing is preparing for the Unit Compliance Inspection; Maintenance is well on their way to being prepared for their Maintenance Standardization Evaluation Program; and, the Aerospace Medicine Squadron is down to finalizing their preparation for the Health Services Inspection.



he 512th Operations Group Commander bid farewell to the Liberty Wing Jan. 30 to take a position as the Director of Air, Space and Intelligence at Dobbins Air Reserve Base, Ga.

Col. Darrell G. Young will work for 22nd AF Commander Maj. Gen. Martin M. Mazick and serve as a functional manager for operations, working issues for flying squadrons, and intelligence and airlift flight control units.

Col. Karl A. Schmitkons, commander of the 302nd Operations

Group at Peterson Air Force Base, Colo., will assume command of the 512th
OG during a ceremony slated for
March 8 at 10:30 a.m. at the Air

Mobility Command Museum. Colonel Young describes his departure from the 512th Airlift Wing as bittersweet.

"This has been the best assignment I've had in the Air Force," said Colonel Young, who was commissioned in 1984, served on active duty for 7.5 years. He entered the Reserve in 1993 and was activated for Operation Iraqi Freedom in 2002 for a year. "This was my first command, and I'll never forget

and civilians because without their support we wouldn't have been able to accomplish what we have in the past two years," said the Colonel.

Col. Robert H. Shepherd, the 512th Operations Group deputy commander and previous commander of the 326th Airlift Squadron, said he appreciated the mentoring his commander provided him and Colonel Young will be missed.

"Colonel Young takes his duty to grow the next generation of leaders very seriously, and he is a tremendous role model," said the 22-year Air Force veteran.

While leaving is not easy, Colonel Young said he is excited about serving in the Air Force at a different level and learning how things operate at 22nd AF.

During his tenure as OG commander, the colonel had to overcome some obstacles. Perhaps the biggest hurdle was recovering the group from the aftermath of the April 3, 2006, C-5B crash, which occurred less than a mile from the base's southern perimeter. The 17 people aboard the aircraft survived the impact. Colonel Young arrived

on station a month after this incident.

"I spent my first year trying to get the group through the legal process," he said. This included the Accident Investigation Board, which released that human error was the cause of the accident.

The wing's next trial was to tackle an Operational Readiness Inspection in 2008. This encompassed more than a year of training and preparation.

"While preparing for the ORI we were able to build a strong mobility culture in our units and do well on the inspection," he said. "I'm proud of the wing's ORI grade."

The 512th Airlift Wing brought home an excellent ORI rating, and two OG units, the 512th Airlift Control Flight and the Intelligence section, were outstanding performers.

Whether it is taking on the ORI or delivering cargo all over the world, the colonel said he attributes the group's success to the effectiveness of the OG leadership team, the group's outstanding Airmen and the group commanders who worked beside him.

"I have a great group of squadron commanders, directors of operations and senior enlisted leaders," he said. "I leave knowing the Operations Group is in good hands and will continue to meet and surpass all future challenges."

"Our mission is to come together as one group of firefighters from five different Air Force bases and form one cohesive troupe," said Master Sgt. John Whye, Station #2 captain. "As the 506th ECES Kirkuk firefighters, our job is to protect, serve and support all operations and personnel at Kirkuk Regional Air Base, including Army personnel."

Kirkuk Regional Air Base is home to the 506th Air Expeditionary Group. The group falls under the 332nd Air Expeditionary Wing at Balad Air Base, Iraq., and comprises six squadrons and more than 900 Airmen.

Sending a group of the 512th's finest "fire dawgs" to the Area of Responsibility is not new to the 512th Civil Engineer Squadron.

"At least one time a year we send out a team of six or more reservists to deploy," said Senior Master Sgt. Brian Cullen, 512th Civil Engineer Squadron deputy fire chief. "I told this group what I tell the others, keep your eyes open, heads down and listen to what you're told to do."

Liberty Wing firefighters are making their presence known in their new unit not just during their working hours, but also spending their off-hours volunteering.

"Some of us volunteer at the chapel to help with acquiring and dispensing school supplies to Iraqi children," said Staff Sgt. James Herr, who works at both Station #land #3 as station captain in the absence of the non-commissioned-officer-in-charge.

Operation Iraqi School Supplies is a program in which the members of the fire departments at KRAB and other bases in Iraq volunteer to help the chapel prepare 400 bags of school supplies for the children of Iraq, thus helping

to foster goodwill, said Sergeant Whye.

Col. Randal L. Bright, 512th AW commander, visited with the Airmen before they left Dover Air Force Base.

"We are proud of you, and we won't forget you or your families while you're gone," said Colonel Bright. "You couldn't do what

> you are about to do without your families' support. Your families are just important to us as you are."

The city of Kirkuk is about 250 kilometers north of Baghdad and has more than

750,000 residents.

The air base, located at the edge of Kirkuk, also hosts the Army's 1st Brigade Combat Team of the 10th Mountain Division. During any given Air and Space Expeditionary Force rotation, about 900 Air Force, Air National Guard and Air Force Reserve members are assigned to the 506th AEG. On average, Air Force deployments last four to six months.

C-5M Super Galaxy arri

he Spirit of Global Reach made its arrival at Dover Air Force Base Feb. 9, putting itself in the history books as Team Dover's first C-5M Super Galaxy.

The aircraft is the first of three C-5Ms Dover will receive for operational testing and evaluation.

"Today we see the fruits of a long-term effort by thousands of personnel to develop an airlifter with greater strategic capability than any of its predecessors," said Col. Manson O. Morris, 436th Airlift Wing commander. "Dover Air Force Base is now home to a highly skilled total force cadre of professionals who will write the first chapter in the operational history of the Super Galaxy. We will have an essential role in applying this aircraft during a rigorous period

of operational test and evaluation. Dover is privileged to be the lead Air Force base for this task."

The C-5M will provide new capabilities for the Air Force. The aircraft has state-of-the-art engines that produce more than 50,000 pounds of thrust, which allow it to carry 285,000 pounds of cargo.

"This aircraft is capable of a significantly shorter take offs than the previous aircraft," said Lt. Col. Mike Semo, 709th Airlift Squadron, Chief, C-5M Program Office. "We are able to take more cargo, farther distances with greater reliability. They've also vastly improved to a glass cockpit which results in greater situational awareness for the pilots. There are upgrades to navigation, safety equipment, communications and a new autopilot system. This really is a modern aircraft for a modern Air Force."

"The new C-5M looks like the same airplane, but it is approximately 10 percent more reliable," added Lt. Col. Tom Loper,

436th Operations Group C-5M project integration office. "The C-5M addressed just about every system on the airplane to increase reliability. It looks the same but it has more thrust so it can climb higher, faster and carry more cargo."

Gen. Arthur J. Lichte, Air Mobility Command commander, delivered the Spirit of Global Reach to Dover.

"Today, we get to add a new all-star to the Dover team lineup," said General Lichte. "We're not closing the book on the C-5, we're simply starting a new chapter with the delivery of this wonderful aircraft, the C-5M Super Galaxy."

"All the men and women who have flown, maintained or supported the C-5 here at Dover have enhanced this wings legacy and carried the load with honor delivering hope to those in need all over the globe. And they have done that for over three decades with tremendous pride," said General Lichte.

Flyers, maintainers ready for Super Galaxy

Reservists in the 512th Airlift Wing have spent a year preparing for the arrival of the first C-5M Super Galaxy.

In addition to training, Dover's Air Force Reserve flyers and maintainers wrote and validated operating procedures, manuals and technical orders in preparation for flying and fixing the modified C-5.

The C-5M Type One training at the Lockheed Martin Aeronautics plant in Marietta, Ga., runs about three weeks and varies for the 709th Airlift Squadron aircrews and 512th Aircraft Maintenance Squadron mechanics.

Fourteen aircrew members have completed the training since January. The 512th AMXS began sending maintainers to the training in May 2008.

"We learn about the aircraft's upgraded systems and how they operate," said Lt. Col. Mike Semo, manager of the C-5M integration project and chief pilot.

In addition to learning about the aircraft's new engines, upgraded flight controls, hydraulic, electrical and fuel systems, the pilots undergo simulator training before flying the C-5M.

The maintainers learn how to troubleshoot, operate and repair the updated systems on the aircraft, said Chief Master Sgt. Fred Eason, 512th AMXS maintenance superintendent. After they return to Dover, the mechanics train others in the squadron.

A C-5 undergoes two upgrades before becoming a C-5M Super Galaxy.

The first phase is the Aircraft Modernization Program here and at Travis Air Force Base, Calif. The aircraft receives a modernized glass cockpit and avionics upgrade, featuring a digital all-weather flight control system and autopilot, a new communications suite, flat panel displays, and enhanced navigation and safety equipment.

The second upgrade is the Reliability Enhancement and Re-engining Program at the Lockheed Martin plant in Marietta, Ga. This program replaces the old engines with quieter and more powerful General Electric CF-6 engines. The aircraft also undergoes 55 system and equipment improvements to increase the C-5's reliability. Some of the modifications include improvements to the airframe structure, flight controls, and hydraulic, electrical and fuel systems.

Because of their experience with the AMP and flying the C-5, Air Force Reserve aircrew members and maintainers have established many of the written procedures and training requirements for the modernized airlifter, said Chief Master Sgt. Donald Cunningham, who underwent Type One training and is part of the team overseeing AMP and RERP modifications at Dover. He has worked on the C-5M project for two years.

Ten aircraft maintainers here have gone to the Marietta plant for training and to verify and validate technical orders for the C-5 M.

"For every task there is a technical order," said Chief Eason. "By having validated the technical orders and ensuring they are correct, we are not taking mechanics down the wrong road while maintaining the aircraft, which saves time and money and ensures a safe, operational aircraft."

Reservists in the 512th bring a lot of experience to this program, according to Chief Cunningham who has been flying on the C-5 for 30 years and has more than 8,500 flight hours.

"By combining this experience with the 436th Airlift Wing's resources, we will be able to make this project successful," he said. "And, the aircraft will perform and meet the increasing demands for worldwide airlift."

Dover will receive its second C-5M in late February.

The Air Force Reserve's 709th AS and the active-duty's 9th AS will spend the next six months familiarizing themselves with the C-5M, training on aerial refueling, tactics and maintaining currency, said Colonel Semo.

In August, the C-5Ms are scheduled to begin operational testing and evaluation. All C-5s in the Air Force inventory currently are undergoing AMP modifications.

After the C-5M's at Dover are tested and evaluated, 51 more C-5s are scheduled to undergo the RERP upgrade to complete their conversion to the C-5M Super Galaxy.

C-5M flies in on wings of Dover AFB heritage

he C-5M's wheels screeched to a halt on the Dover Air Force Base flightline and taxied in front of Hangar 706, where a crowd eagerly awaited the arrival of the first Super Galaxy. Seated in that crowd were four Airmen who ushered in Dover's strategic airlift era with the delivery of the base's first C-5 Galaxy almost 40 years ago.

Tom Dennis, Les Finney, Dr. Willie Curtis and Bob Valeski, crewmembers of the original C-5A delivered here in 1971, were present once again to witness a new era of military airlift Feb. 9.

While the C-5M was received with pomp and circumstance, it was business as usual when the 9th Airlift Squadron crew delivered Dover's first C-5 April 16, 1971.

"There was not a big deal made out of the arrival of the C-5A, but I knew we were part of history," said retired major and C-5 pilot Mr. Dennis, who lives in Dover and retired in 1977. "After we flew in with the aircraft, it was just another day. We finished up and got ready for work the next day."

The refurbished C-5M, named Spirit of Global Reach, was delivered by Gen. Arthur J. Lichte, Air Mobility Command commander, who accepted the symbolic key to the aircraft in front of Dover's total force audience and key civic leaders. The ceremony included the U.S. Air Force Band Ceremonial Brass Quintet, the base honor guard and speeches by Lockheed Martin representatives, government officials and military leaders.

During the ceremony, General Lichte asked the four original crewmembers to stand and receive their long overdue recognition. Silhouetted by the backdrop of flags, brass and the new aircraft, the cadre of Dover's original C-5 aircrew were finally acknowledged in

front of their Air Force family.

"I felt proud to be part of the program

[delivering the C-5A to Dover AFB] and

having the trust of my commander and the crewmembers," said Dr. Curtis, former senior master sergeant and squadron standardization loadmaster, who retired in 1978. "I was proud of the excellent transition in airlift missions of the U.S. Air Force and Dover Air Force Base."

Dr. Curtis said he was delighted when he received the invitation to take part in the C-5M delivery ceremony and to meet his fellow crewmembers who accompanied him that historic day in April.

"Getting the invitation to be here brought back a lot of good memories," said Mr. Finney, a former C-5 engineer and chief master sergeant who spent 28 years on active duty. "Our C-5 crew flew missions to Vietnam, Iran, Alaska and all over the world. It was great to be part of that team."

One such mission that the first C-5s flew was in 1977, which involved hauling a 40-ton electromagnet from Chicago to Moscow in support of a joint energy research program between the two countries. That mission earned the crew the MacKay Trophy, awarded yearly by the Air Force for the "most meritorious flight of the year" by an Air Force person, persons or organization.

"I have been out of the Air Force for over 20 years," said Mr. Finney, who retired in 1984. "I miss it. I miss flying. I miss the people. I saw a lot of the old guys I flew with over the years sitting in that audience, other guys from the squad who had also retired. It was like a homecoming."



Delivering Hope

C-17 crew transports humanitarian cargo to Nicaragua

Dover Air Force Base C-17 Globemaster III aircrew airlifted 18,000 pounds of humanitarian cargo from here to Nicaragua Jan. 17 through 19.

The 326th Airlift Squadron Airmen delivered desks, chairs, file cabinets and books for the new library at Ave Maria University, Latin American Campus, in San Marcos, Carazo.

The school is a one-hour drive from the Managua International Airport, where the Reserve crew delivered the supplies. The cargo was delivered as part of the Denton Program. The Denton Program is a Department of Defense transportation program that uses available military air, surface and sea-lift assets to deliver humanitarian cargo donated by charities or private donors.

"About three years ago, the school began constructing a new library as the original library was too small," said Elizabeth Garcia, the director of library services who's been employed by the university since 1995. "The library will benefit the 450 students who attend the university and the 600 students who are learning English at the language institute on campus."

The U.S.-accredited university has been open for 15 years. It is a branch of Ave Maria University in Naples, Fla.

"The Florida campus donated these supplies through the Denton

Program," said Mrs. Garcia, an American whose husband is Nicaraguan. They moved back to his native country in 1979.

The Denton Program is jointly administered by the Department of State, Department of Defense and the U.S. Agency for International Development. USAID helps more than 100 countries with agriculture, education, health and humanitarian assistance, according to the USAID website. From 1990 to 2008, USAID has provided \$1.37 billion in assistance to Nicaragua.

Nicaragua, with 5.7 million people, is one of the poorest in the Western Hemisphere, according to USAID. Almost half of the nation's population lives in poverty, which affects women and children most severely, according to Unite for Children.

"This is probably one of my favorite Reserve missions because it's humanitarian," said Lt. Col. Mike Miller, the 326th AS director of operations. "This is a very noble mission as we are helping people less fortunate than us. It's a chance to give back."

The Air Force Reserve and the Air National Guard conduct many of the Denton missions because they are able to use their training missions to deliver the humanitarian supplies.

"This is great overseas training for us because Central America can be a demanding flying area as there are language barriers and the terrain is difficult," Colonel Miller said. "Also, radar coverage is not as good, and airfields are not as well prepared as in other parts of the world."

Tax Time

Free tax assistance available to reservists

ith the tax season looming, there are a few avenues of assistance available for those 512th Airlift Wing members who are not in touch with their inneraccountant.

Military One Source, which offers free tax software, the Volunteer Income Tax Assistance program and the Dover Air Force Base's legal offices are all available to help Liberty Wing Airmen and their families prepare their tax returns.

Military One Source, at https://www.militaryonesource.com, provides professional tax software, which guides users online through the required forms and documentation and asks tax-relevant questions in a very user-friendly fashion, said Master Sgt. Michelle Anderson, 712th Aircraft Maintenance squadron orderly room non-commissioned-officer-in-charge and the wing's VITA representative.

Servicemembers will be able to complete a federal and state tax return, using an online interview process to walk them through the return process, electronically file a tax return, print and file a tax return, and check e-file status, according to Military One Source. Users are also able to transfer information from other tax software programs into the free program.

The VITA program, managed by the 436th Airlift Wing Legal Office, also offers basic income tax preparation and electronic filing at no cost to military members, retirees and their family members.

At Dover Air Force Base, there are 22 VITA representatives spread out among the wing's squadrons assisting those who need help with their taxes. These volunteers undertake a five-day course each year, instructed by the Internal Revenue Service, to learn the basics of filing income taxes. Each volunteer is required to complete and pass a test in order to be certified as a VITA representative.

Airmen who would like to take advantage of this program may contact Sergeant Anderson at 677-6823. Sergeant Anderson has been a 512th AW VITA for the past four years and is able to sit down one-on-one with members and navigate them through their tax information.

Another avenue for tax help is to contact the Dover AFB legal offices.

"If members have questions about their taxes

during a UTA [Unit Training Assembly], they can contact our office," said Lt. Col. Carmel-Ann Feliciani, 512th AW judge advocate. "However, we are encouraging members to use the free tax preparation service from Military One Source."

If a member needs to prepare a return, the 512th AW legal office will do the intake and have the active-duty office prepare the return, said Colonel Feliciani.

When filing bring the following tax documents:

- Social Security numbers for the reservist, their spouse and dependents
- Child care, education and adoption costs
- W-2 Forms for all employers for the reservist and their spouse. Reservists can download their W-2's at https://mypay.dfas.mil.
- Investment income forms
- Alimony information
- Social Security benefits
- Miscellaneous income
- Form 1098-E for student loan interest
- Form 1098 for home mortgage interest
- Charitable donations
- Medical and dental expenses
- Real estate taxes

The 2008 federal tax deadline is April 15, and the state tax deadline for Delaware is April 30. Extensions are sometimes given to deployed military members.

Recruiting program sweetens prize selection

That if you could choose who you work alongside?
What if you could win a television, IPOD or other great prizes for making that choice?

This scenario isn't too good to be true; it's the Air Force Reserve's Get 1 Now program.

With the intention of maintaining a quality corps, the Air Force Reserve's

recruiting program, Get 1 Now, was refurbished last year to offer more motivating incentives.

"The idea is if you refer someone to your recruiting office, it is a person you would like to work with. Essentially, you're choosing your colleagues," said Master Sgt. Michael DiLorenzo, 512th Airlift Wing senior recruiter.

Some Liberty Wing members have used the program for just that reason.

"I didn't want to lose her after her time here as a student hire," said Staff Sgt. Jessica Hatch, 512th Mission Support Squadron personnel employment chief, who recruited Airman Basic Ashley Eason, 512th MSS personnel employment assistant. "I also knew she could benefit from the GI Bill and the tuition assistance offered by the Air Force Reserve."

Airman Eason is currently a student at Delaware Technical and Community College, where she is majoring in human relations.

"I was always interested in joining, but the money for school was definitely a hook for me," said Airman Eason, who said she is also interested in recruiting through Get 1 Now.

If working with friends and family isn't enough of a reason to participate in the program, the list of rewards might be a good incentive.

"One accession through Get 1 Now rewards a person with items like a portable DVD player or an IPOD Nano," said Sergeant DiLorenzo. "The prizes get better with the more accessions, like flat- screen high-definition televisions and digital cameras."

There are four award levels and multiple awards in the first three levels. Level four requires 10 or more accessions with the award being a laptop computer. The availability of awards is calculated by how many individuals a reservists can get to join from Oct. 1, 2008, through September. The possible recruits must join within 24 months of being referred by a

reservist.

In order for a reservist to participate in Get 1 Now, they need a current account. An account can be created by logging onto http://get1now. us. Some reservists might already be in the system from a previous referral, or have been automatically given a Get 1 Now account if they recently joined the Air Force Reserve. It's recommended that reservists contact an advisor or call 1-877-786-2372 to see if they have an account.

"The Air Force Reserve has something that can help out almost everybody," said Sergeant DiLorenzo. "Some people may have left active-duty and miss the military's camaraderie, some may be fresh out of high school and need direction or money or college, and others may be interested in the medical benefits or extra money. Any of those reasons, combined with the awards offered, is a great reason to refer people to us through Get 1 Now."
