Records Check

Reservists need to check personnel records online before it's too late

For a “seasoned” Air Force member like myself, embracing the electronic era can sometimes feel like a daunting task, especially as more and more programs are migrating online.

One of the most recent computerized transitions is one that will have a huge impact on your career. Earlier in the year and in line with the rest of the Air Force, our wing’s personnel records were transferred to Headquarters Air Reserve Personnel Center in Denver, Colo. There, the hard copy files were scanned and imported into an electronic database, which brings us to the next step I think we should all make sure we do before the deadline.

On Oct. 21, ARPC is scheduled to destroy all of the hard copy records they’ve received. This includes your enlisted and officer performance reports and Department of Defense Form 214s (Certificate of Release or Discharge from Active Duty).

These records, previously maintained by the 512th Military Personnel Flight Customer Service section are the property of the Air Force, not the individual. The Air Force directs their management and disposition, and ARPC will not return these records to the base or the member as we have asked.

It is imperative for you to take the time to review the electronic images of your virtual record online. I’m glad I did; I found one electronic scan that did not offer the best readability. ARPC was very helpful in trying to restore the image online and even mailed a hard copy to my home. Once those hard copy records are gone, they’re gone; and, it may become extremely difficult to verify some very important information later in your career such as DD-214s.

An e-mail was sent out last month by our 512th Mission Support Squadron detailing how to log on and view your records online. Even in this digital age, I’m aware some members may not have daily access to their military e-mail account, so I’ve included a shortcut to get you there from home or work.

Be sure to conduct your review from a government

computer or use your Common Access Card reader at home to access the secure Automated Record Management System site.

Log onto the Air Force Personnel Center Secure Web site at <https://www.afpc.randolph.af.mil/afpcsecure/MainMenu.asp> or via the AF Portal at <https://armsweb.afpc.randolph.af.mil/CyberDOCS/noticeARMS.htm>.

If you have any difficulties with ARMS, consult the 512th MPF at (302) 677-3523 or e-mail Tech. Sgt. Erica Weatherspoon at erica.weatherspoon@dover.af.mil.

After reviewing your records in ARMS notify ARPC with any discrepancies at ARPC.DPO@ARPC.DENVER.AF.MIL or call (800) 525-0102.

Since I’m an airline pilot, I compare a lot of things to flying. Imagine you are on a B-737 and the oxygen masks drop down. Take care of yourself first and then help those around you.

Supervisors, over the next couple of unit training assemblies, ensure your Airmen are afforded an opportunity to analyze what’s been archived electronically. It could greatly impact an Airman’s career. If you fail to view these documents now and are missing legible documents, then expect to spend countless hours trying to locate vital records, so they can reaccomplish a DD-214 or some other document that was not readable online or simply never scanned.

News, photos now to be found online

After more than 25 years in existence, the Liberty Press will change formats in an effort to keep the wing in line with the digital era.

This issue will be the last bi-monthly edition to arrive in the mail. The 512th Public Affairs Office is embracing several new electronic endeavors, which reduces the number of Liberty Press mailings to once a year.

“More and more people are getting their information and news from the World Wide Web, and many prominent newspapers around the world have also focused their attention to online reporting as well as social media avenues such as Facebook and Twitter,” said Capt. Marnee A.C. Losurdo, chief of 512th PA. “In fact, almost everything that you read in the Liberty Press has already been posted on our Web site.”

For those individuals who do prefer a printed product, the transition to the Web may be a challenge. However, in a time of limited budgets and personnel constraints, the Air Force issued a policy to end its long-standing tradition of producing papers in lieu of online publications.

Some bases, such as Dover, opted to contract out their newspaper two years ago, said 1st Lt. Brian Maguire, chief of 436th PA.

“Rather than military members laying out the Airlifter, a civilian organization publishes it; and, in turn, that organization earns money from the sale of advertisements,” he said. “This is what’s known as a commercial enterprise newspaper.”

Per Air Force Instruction, every base is entitled to only one newspaper, unless there’s a specialized need, such as Reserve units assigned to a host base that has members who reside at various geographical areas. In these circumstances, Reserve units, including the Liberty Wing, are required to pay for the printing and mailing of their periodicals, which is costly.

However, reservists and their families won’t have to rely entirely on the Web.

“We plan to create an annual almanac edition similar to that of ‘The Book’ done by Airman magazine,” said Master Sgt. Veronica A. Aceveda, Liberty Press editor. “This periodical will not only feature wing news, features and pictures from throughout the year, but it will also include leadership biographies, fact sheets on the unit and its aircraft, a list of UTA dates as well as highlight any benefits and services available to reservists and family members.”

The 512th Airlift Wing is not alone in making this move toward modern technology. As of mid August, only 13 out of 34 Air Force Reserve Command units were printing a publication. Over the past couple of years, a noticeable trend for many PA offices showed newspapers reducing their frequency to bi-monthly, then quarterly, online only and ultimately for some, they were eliminated all together. Many units made this decision in order to focus on their Web sites and other social media, in addition to saving money and manpower.

Full-time 512th AW employees have already begun seeing part of the Liberty Press’ next look. The Liberty Press Weekly, a one-page edition of news, events and other information is sent via e-mail every Monday and will be posted online.

Thirteen Airmen from the 512th Security Forces Squadron here returned from a six-month deployment to Kirkuk Regional Air Base, Iraq, at the end of July.

The reservists, assigned to the 506th Expeditionary Security Forces Squadron, provided base defense operations such as perimeter security, entry control and base patrol.

The city of Kirkuk, located approximately 250 kilometers north of the capital city Baghdad, has more than 750,000 residents. More than 4,000 U.S. personnel work at the air base, located at the edge of Kirkuk. Units serving there include the 506th Air Expeditionary Group; the U.S. Army's 18th Engineer Battalion; the 6th Squadron, 6th Cavalry Regiment of the 10th Mountain Division; the 3rd Brigade of the 25th Infantry Division; and, the U.S. State Department Provincial Reconstruction Team.

Master Sgt. Raymond Mooney led the first team of Dover Air Force Base security forces specialists who ranged in ranks from senior airman to master sergeant. Two 512th SFS teams are still serving with the 506th ESFS.

It was a deployment of firsts for Sergeant Mooney and some of his teammates. While he has deployed before on active duty, this was the first time the reservist was charged with being a team leader.

"It was a challenge to have full responsibility for the team," said Sergeant Mooney. "Some people were stressed about leaving their families, so I tried to keep the morale up and keep the team focused on accomplishing the mission."

Staff Sgt. James Black, 512th SFS, said the toughest aspect of his deployment was leaving behind his pregnant wife, Shanah, who, in August, was in her ninth month of pregnancy.

"It was hard to leave her behind knowing she would be going

through the majority of her pregnancy on her own," he said.

This was the first deployment for the Lower Merion, Penn., policeman who enlisted into the Air Force Reserve in 2004. At Kirkuk RAB, Sergeant Black patrolled the base perimeter and worked in the towers, where he monitored the surrounding area for potential threats.

"It was a good experience to see the broader aspect of the Air Force mission and how we operate in a deployed location," he said.

Sergeant Mooney, a U.S. Capitol police officer, said he also increased his knowledge of security forces operations. This was the first time he worked in a base defense operations center, a command and control facility that serves as the focal point for base security and defense.

"It was a learning experience working in the BDOC," said Sergeant Mooney, who added the base was attacked 16 times while the team was there. "The first time was a little intimidating; after that, it became somewhat normal. Fortunately, nobody was injured while we were there."

While the team conducted their pre-deployment training together at Mineral Wells, Texas, they worked in different areas and shifts on Kirkuk RAB.

"It would have been great to have been able to work together," said Sergeant Mooney. "But despite this, the group did really well.

"I'm proud of the team and how they represented Dover Air Force Base," said Sergeant Mooney. "During this whole process, from the pre-deployment training throughout the deployment, everyone maintained a positive attitude and had a lot of enthusiasm despite the long days and long nights. We made a positive first impression and led the way for the two 512th SFS teams who followed us and are still serving there."

GOING BIG

Team Dover flies to one of nation's biggest air shows

Every year Wittman Regional Airport in Oshkosh, Wisc., hosts one of the nation's largest Air Shows, the Experimental Aircraft Association AirVenture, bragging an attendance of more than 500,000 during the week.

This year, 20 Team Dover members from both the 436th and 512th Airlift Wings flew a C-5M Super Galaxy, The Spirit of Normandy, to represent Dover Air Force Base and Air Mobility Command. Nearly 10,000 spectators of all ages toured the aircraft and asked the Dover crew a myriad of questions -- How much does it weigh? What can it carry? Where do you fly?

"It is a great feeling to be able to support these kinds of events," said Col.

Dave Horton, 436th Operations Group commander. "We come out here and enjoy the throng of people who come through to see this airplane and hear about what we do; it's just amazing."

Even while waiting for their morning breakfast at the hotel, interested Air Show attendees would ask Airmen questions regarding the C-5M.

"I was an Airman 1st Class back in the '50s, and we didn't have anything like [the C 5M] back then," said Mel Cook. "It really is an amazing aircraft. It's so big; it's hard to believe."

The trip also allowed the crew to interact with the next generation of Airmen.

"The aircraft is so huge, I walked through and got to ask questions," said four-year-old Rory Broderick, who then proceeded to ask more questions about

the massive plane.

The crew also played host to Oklahoma Senator James Inhofe who was attending his 31st EAA Airshow. As a pilot, he was keenly interested in the airplane's enhanced reliability and capability as well as how it factored into the overall modernization plans for AMC.

After two days, the crew of The Spirit of Normandy packed up their equipment; and, as thousands lined up to watch, they performed a maximum effort take-off to return home to Dover.

"In two days, we were able to pass more than 10,000 visitors through our plane and probably answer as many questions," said Colonel Horton. "These events are not only good training for the crew, but it's great to be able to interact with the public, many of whom don't get to see these aircraft on a daily basis."

Liberty Wing reservists work to form Canadian sister squadron program

Reservists here visited members of the Canadian air force's 8 Wing at Canadian Forces Base Trenton, Ontario, Aug. 22 - 24 as part of an effort to initiate a sister squadron program.

Airmen with Dover's 512th Airlift Wing hoped to forge a partnership with the Canadian Airmen and identify training opportunities for flying, aerial port operations, airlift control and maintenance procedures.

A C-17 Globemaster III and 10 members from the 326th Airlift Squadron, 46th Aerial Port Squadron, 512th Airlift Control Flight and 712th Aircraft Maintenance Squadron flew to the Canadian base, two miles northeast of Trenton, Ontario, to meet with active-duty members of the 429 Transport Squadron and 2 Air Movements Squadron.

The program was the brain child of 326th AS Commander Lt. Col. Craig LaFave. He said he developed the idea of pairing up with the Canadians while working as the 512th AW program integration officer transitioning the 326th AS to the C-17 in 2007 and 2008. However, a series of inspections in 2008 and early 2009 put the idea on the back burner until this summer, he said.

Much like the 326th AS, the 429 TS has been flying the C-17 since the summer of 2007.

The 429 TS is part of the 8 Wing, which is the heart of Canada's air mobility forces and is one of the largest air force bases in Canada. In addition to the C-17, 8 Wing also flies the CC-130 Hercules, CC-150 Polaris, the CH-149 Cormorant tactical transport search and rescue helicopter and the CC-144 Challenger, which transports VIPs, according to the unit's Web site.

During the three-day venture, 326th AS Aircraft Commander Capt. Steve Churchill and his crew

received a flight briefing Aug. 22 about air space protocols and procedures. The next day, the 326th AS aircrew flew a training mission consisting of low-level navigation, assault landing zone operations, tactical arrivals and departures in Canadian military airspace.

"It's great for low-level flying," said Captain Churchill. "We benefited from this training, because we were able to fly procedures we can't typically conduct on the East Coast due to heavier air traffic."

Future plans are to fly with 429 TS aircrews, said the captain.

"The program will allow our crews and unit personnel to exchange unclassified tactics, techniques and procedures while building camaraderie with our Canadian allies," said Colonel LaFave.

Dover Air Force Base reservists traveled to Trenton in Ontario province to identify future training opportunities with the Canadians.

Members of the 46th APS and 512th ALCF met with 2 Air Movements Squadron members Aug. 24 and received a tour of their facilities. On average, the Canadian squadron processes 23 million pounds of freight and 42,000 passengers annually, according to the unit's Web site.

"Anytime we can get together and train it will enhance our mutual operations, which are not all that different," said Maj. Aaron Spott, 2 AMS commanding officer. "We deploy to the same areas and share the same ramp space, so the more we know about each other's systems, the better we can work together."

Senior Master Sgt. Dan Schultz, NCO in charge of the 46th APS ramp section, said he is looking forward to working with the Canadians.

"We like this idea, because it's an excellent opportunity to jointly train together, which is beneficial for us, especially with an Operational Readiness Exercise next year and the Operational Readiness Inspection in 2011," said Sergeant Schultz.

But, this isn't the first time 512th AW reservists have trained with the Canadians.

"The Canadians have been down here this summer using our C-17 simulator, and my special projects office has sat down with them during the planning for these missions," said Colonel LaFave.

The 512th ALCF and reservists from throughout 22nd Air Force participated in Maple Flag Exercise 42, held at Cold Lake Air Base, Alberta, Canada, from May 29 - June 14.

The wing's next trip to Canada is planned for Sept 12-14.

"We hope we can continue a regular exchange, probably quarterly or semi-annually," said Colonel LaFave.

Team Dover participates in Air Mobilty competition

Airmen from the 512th and 436th Airlift Wings have returned to Dover Air Force Base, Del., after participating in the Air Mobility RODEO 2009 at McChord AFB, Wash., July 19-25.

More than 100 teams, including seven foreign countries, faced off in the biannual competition, which tested the Airmen in airlift operations including aerial port, maintenance, security forces and aircrew.

Although Team Dover's extensive preparation and cohesiveness didn't result in any trophies, the competition did serve as a vital learning experience for the participants.

"The RODEO was a great experience and I thought the blended team concept worked well," said Lt. Col. Kevin Higginbotham, team chief and 326th Airlift Squadron member.

For most of Team Dover's participants, this year's RODEO was a first-time experience.

Senior Airman Mark Devine, 436th Security Forces Squadron, said the competition was the highlight of his Air Force career so far.

"I feel more confident training-wise, and I'd love to take some of the stuff I learn to show people back at home station," said Airman Devine.

In the closing ceremony celebration on July 24, 74 awards were announced to the competing teams. Among the different categories was the Best Air Mobility Team award, which went to the 62nd Airlift Wing, McChord AFB. The scoring was close, with the final results being tallied just minutes prior to the ceremony.

"What an amazing week this has been for the mobility community and from what I saw, (RODEO) was just as competitive as I thought it would be," said General Arthur J. Lichte, Air Mobility Command commander, during his closing remarks at the ceremony. "Everyone is leaving here a winner."

As Team Dover works together to hone their skills and tactics gained from the RODEO, Colonel Higginbotham said he was determined to have the wings come home as winners in the future.

"We look forward to doing RODEO again in two years, and next time we'll bring home a trophy," he said.

Air Force Reserve unit and blended unit (Reserve-Regular Air Force) teams combined to win 15 events at Air Mobility Rodeo 2009, the U.S. Air Force's premier mobility competition, at McChord Air Force Base, Wash., July 19-24.

- Team McGuire, McGuire AFB, N.J. (305th Air Mobility Wing and 514th AMW) – Best Combat Endurance Course Team, Best Backing/Combat Offload Crew, Best KC-10 Cargo Loading Crew, Best KC-10 Pre-flight Team and Best KC-10 Maintenance Team.



- Jan/Feb 1983:**
- The wing paper is initiated with a name suggestion contest as the lead story.
 - Master Sgt. Robert Mooney traded his silver chevrons for gold bars as he was commissioned as a second lieutenant. The Honorable Robert A. Mooney retired from the Air Force Reserve and went on to become the mayor of Camden.
 - Distribution was made during sign-in and out.



- May/June 1983:**
- The Talon was the name chosen for the paper.
 - The first of 76 C-5A Galaxys were fitted with new wings under a wing modification program.
 - Reserve members can now feel more secure about keeping their civilian jobs when participating in military training. The 1982 Labor Department policy that limited the amount of military training a member could receive and still claim re-employment has been rescinded.
 - Caroline Vennell was promoted to staff sergeant. She went on to serve in the wing's highest enlisted position, command chief. She retired in 2007.

Dec 1995:

- The Dover Weasels, a 512th and 436th AW rugby team, beat the previous year's national military rugby champions, the Quantico U.S. Marine Corps, 12 to 5.



Jan/Feb 1996:

- 512th AW takes part in Operation Joint Endeavor by hauling more than 600 tons of cargo in support of peacekeeping efforts in Bosnia.

Mar/Apr 1997:

- 512th Civil Engineer Squadron provides humanitarian aid in South America by building a concrete school with plumbing and electricity.

Jul/Aug 1997:

- 2nd Lts. Randy Correia, William Mills and Gilbert Kesser were commissioned through the Deserving Airman Commissioning Program.

- Reservists to receive voluntary dental plan Oct. 1.

May/June 1998:

- Liberty Wing dedicates gazebo at AMC Museum in celebration of AF Reserve's golden anniversary.

- Capt. James Johann won 512th Aircraft Generation Squadron Junior Officer of the Year and went on to win 512th AW Junior Officer of the Year.

Sep/Oct 1998:

- Master Sgt. Janet Hawkins was the first wing member to complete the new Senior NCO Academy course on CD-Rom.

- Marshall Lott is the first civilian employee in Air Force Reserve Command to take a college level examination program in the wing.

Feb 1999:

- Staff Sgts. Marina Jefferson and Charles Boyer were featured on their opinions about reservists now being able to shop at the commissary 24 times a year.

Mar 1999:





Liberty Wing Web site tool to use

While it may be the end of an era for the 512th Airlift Wing's magazine, the Liberty Press, it doesn't mean reservists won't have instant access to wing events, news and photos.

From their homes, wing members and their families can access wing news, photos, factsheets and biographies with the click of a mouse on www.512aw.afrc.af.mil.

The 512th AW has had a public Web site since 1999. And, the fact is more and more people are getting their news and information from the Internet. Approximately 1.5 billion people currently use the Internet out of a global population of 6.7 billion, according to the World Internet Usage Statistics News and Populations Stats. Currently, the wing's public Web site is visited by 3,700 people monthly.

And, the wing's Web site has a lot of user friendly features. It was recently redesigned and offers users new content such as slideshows, video capability, blog-like commenting on content and an improved search function.

Wing members can subscribe to RSS feeds. RSS is an acronym for Rich Site Summary or Really Simple Syndication. What it means for users is if they have a favorite Web site or blog they like to visit, rather than having to

remember the site and visit it regularly, they can subscribe to RSS and have updated content sent to their desktop, blog or Web site automatically. RSS can also be used to deliver audio content, typically in an MP3 format, which users can listen to on their computer, phone or MP3 player.

The 512th Public Affairs shop also now has the capability to create and post online news and feature videos highlighting key wing events such as the recent video clip of the wing

picnic. Another unique feature is the Since the Last UTA audio podcast.

"This was designed to help keep traditional reservists in the loop, so they don't feel left out of what's happened in the wing and around base since they've been gone," said Master Sgt. Veronica Aceveda, 512th PA NCO in charge. "It's typically updated the Wednesday prior to the UTA, so reservists can even check it from home before they arrive for drill."

Another product to keep full-time unit members informed is the Liberty Wing Weekly, an e-bulletin of news briefs and events that occur each week. It's e-mailed every Monday and will be posted online.

Additional information on the site includes graphics, a question and answer section and features key links to informative Web sites, such as the 512th Airman and Family

Readiness Center, which benefits reservists and their families.

So, when the Liberty Press stops arriving in the mail, reservists and their families can turn to the wing's Web site, www.512aw.afrc.af.mil.

Wing has AF Portal page too

Another option for unit members to obtain information is the wing's Air Force Portal site on <https://www.my.af.mil/faf/FAF/fafHome.jsp>. To locate the wing's page log in to the Portal, click on Org A-Z listing, 0-9, and locate the 512th Airlift Wing.

The site has a lot of the same information as the public website, to include the wing phone book and organizational chart. Each squadron can set up a portal page and use it to post squadron specific information; and, if members have a CAC reader at home, they can access the AF Portal from their residence.

Getting fit: Liberty Wing reservists get results with CrossFit

About 20 Liberty Wing Airmen recently embraced a program called CrossFit, which resulted in improving their physical fitness assessment results.

CrossFit is the creation of former gymnast Greg Glassman, and the prescription of this exercise regime calls for three things: constant variation, high intensity and functional movements such as pushing, pulling, squatting, lifting or running.

George Dobbins, owner of CrossFit Dover, trained about 20 Liberty Wing Airmen for three months this summer. He trained the Airmen on proper technique, cardiovascular endurance, stamina and strength training.

Master Sgt. Jeremy Lee, 709th Airlift Squadron loadmaster, said he decided to try this new exercise program to enhance his current fitness and was interested in trying a different workout option.

Many of the training sessions utilized teams and took place both inside and outside. During this time, Sergeant Lee and his Reserve counterparts were introduced to new equipment and exercises such as the Kettlebell Swing, Sumo Deadlift High Pull and Burpees.

Training sessions varied, so the workout of the day was rarely repeated. And, while individuals competed primarily against themselves, there was always some friendly competition, said Sergeant Lee.

Following the three months, of training several of the reservists completed their annual fitness test, and results were evident.

"After completing the three-month program, I took my annual physical fitness assessment and shaved 1 minute and 18 seconds off my mile-and-a-half-run time," said Sergeant Lee. "The biggest change I've noticed is I have an increased level of energy throughout the day. In fact, the change has been so significant I've continued training with CrossFit at least three to four times a week."

Although not new to the exercise program, Master Sgt. Charles Thomson, 46th Aerial Port Squadron, started training in September 2008 and said it's made a huge difference in improving his fitness score.

"I was able to successfully pass the Air Force fitness test before, but the part of the test that caused the most problem was the run," he said. "However, in just two months of Crossfitting I improved my run, and I was able to cut approximately two minutes off my run time. I was taught a different running style that improved my form and

reduced the discomfort of running."

Master Sgt. Phillip Vickery, 326th AS loadmaster, said CrossFit has changed his life. He has been doing the exercise program for more than two years and received instructor certifications more than a year ago. He also assisted in training the Airmen undergoing the three-month program.

"Since joining CrossFit, I have lost 40 pounds and improved my physical fitness assessment score from a 77 to a 90," said Sergeant Vickery. "I'm in the best shape of my whole life right now, and CrossFit has now become a family affair."

His wife Heather just received her instructor certification in August and is working on the creation of a children's workout program.

"In fact, our lives have changed so much, it's no longer a question of how do we work our CrossFit time into our lives, but how do we fit everything else into our daily schedule," said Sergeant Vickery.

CrossFit is not unique to Dover Air Force Base. Several stateside bases such as Travis AFB, Andrews AFB, Bolling AFB, Schriever AFB, and Luke AFB have fully staffed CrossFit Centers that challenge Airmen in high intensity settings.

New Post 9/11 GI Bill now underway

The Defense Department is accepting registrations to transfer servicemembers' Post-9/11 GI Bill benefits to their spouses or children. To get started, Airmen must get counseling from their education center, said Lt. Gen. Charles E. Stenner Jr., commander of Air Force Reserve Command, in a letter to commanders. Next, they must have at least four years retainability, unless retirement-eligible, before they can transfer the benefits. Servicing military personnel flights can assist. Then, Airmen must verify family member information in the Defense Eligibility Enrollment System is accurate before attempting to apply to transfer the benefits.

Once all of this is complete, Airmen can apply online at www.dmdc.osd.mil/TEB. The site is accessible using a common access card, Defense Department self-service user identification or a Defense Finance and Accounting Service personal identification number.

The Post-9/11 GI Bill is available to most Air National Guard and Air Force Reserve members who have served a cumulative of at least 90 days of active duty since Sept. 11, 2001, other than annual or school tours. The most current and accurate information on the new benefit is available at www.gibill.va.gov or by calling (888) GIBILL-1.

DoD supports goal of tobacco-free military

An Institute of Medicine report titled "Combating Tobacco in Military and Veteran Populations," calls for Defense Department officials to set a timeline to eliminate smoking on military installations. DOD officials fully support the goal of a tobacco-free military and officials believe it's achievable through development and execution of a comprehensive plan as recommended by the report.

The report also recommends DOD officials stop selling tobacco products in military commissaries and exchanges, to prohibit tobacco use anywhere on military installations, and to treat tobacco use in the same way as other health-related behaviors, such as alcohol abuse and poor physical fitness.

Luke AFB Airmen to test new ABU boot

Stain resistant, low maintenance boot prototypes will soon be tested by Airmen at Luke Air Force Base, Ariz.

"This boot is expected to be a solution for low-maintenance footwear that upholds a professional military image no matter the environment," said 1st Lt. Ashley Hawkes, the airman battle uniform program manager at the Air Force Uniform Office.

"The current boot turns black when exposed to chemicals, such as those associated with flightline operations," the lieutenant said.

The prototype selected will be low-maintenance and resistant to staining from harsh chemicals, oils and fuels. Maintenance is expected to be limited to wiping with a damp cloth.

Previous wear tests were conducted on the suede leather boot currently issued, but the results were unacceptable.

"The boots we've tested up until now have fallen short in maintaining a clean appearance," said Master Sgt. James Lynn, an Air Force Uniform Office subject matter expert. "We are confident this current test will provide the right answer."

Four prototypes, from different manufacturers, were selected for testing. Each boot is made of low-maintenance material designed to withstand exposure to chemicals in industrial areas.

Two hundred Airmen will participate in the testing. The Airmen had size measurements taken June 10 and the testing of the prototypes is scheduled to begin in August and last 45 days.

The main focus of this testing is to evaluate stain resistance characteristics of each prototype while worn in industrial environments. The prototypes will be exposed to situations that result in black stains on the current issue boot.

Airmen will complete an end-user survey at the end of the evaluation period, and a sample of the boots will be returned to the Air Force Uniform Office for analysis.

"Extensive research has gone into developing a boot to meet operational requirements, while being low-maintenance and maintaining a professional appearance for our Airmen," Lieutenant Hawkes said. "The results of this test will pave the way ahead." *(Courtesy Air Force News)*

Title 10 change for ART mandatory separation date

There was a recent change to Title 10 on the mandatory separation date for Air Reserve Technicians, which created a new command policy for ART officers.

The previous policy allowed ART officers to request an MSD extension to the date at which eligible for an unreduced civil service retirement annuity. The command policy is now expanded, allowing ART officers to request an MSD extension to age 60.

ART officers whose current MSD falls between June 4, 2009 and June 4, 2011, will be contacted by Headquarters Air Force Reserve Command to determine their desire to request or decline an MSD extension to age 60.

Some reservists invited back to funded billets

Lt. Gen. Charles Stenner, commander of the Air Force Reserve Command, signed a memo recently authorizing Participating Individual Ready Reserve members to enter paid status as Individual Mobilization Augmentees.

Some members currently in the PIRR are former IMAs who lost their positions in 2007 when approximately 5,000 IMA slots were unfunded during a reduction of 7,700 AFRC manpower authorizations. This Pro-

gram Budget Decision 720 initiative helped pay for force modernization. Senior AFRC leaders worked closely with regular Air Force major commands to make tough decisions while maintaining mission capability.

In 2007, Air Force leaders decided to increase Air Force end strength. Consequently, AFRC recently was authorized to add approximately 4,200 positions for new, emerging and critical missions. Of those authorizations, approximately 800 are IMA positions.

Current PIRR members are being given preference in filling these IMA billets. A PIRR member can also be assigned as an overage in an IMA billet if a primary billet is not available or can be assigned against a "pseudo" billet. The overage position is authorized for only two years from date of assignment, so members should still be looking for a primary billet during the two-year period. This program does not apply to colonels, chief master sergeants, academy liaison officers or Civil Air Patrol members.

The federal civilian defense acquisition work force is expected to grow by about 20,000 over the next five years as Defense Department officials increase and reshape the acquisition work.

The Defense Department will increase the number of federal civilian employees conducting acquisitions-related jobs by 20,000, while reducing its contractor work force by about 10,000. This will expand the acquisition work force from its current 127,000 federal employees and 52,000 contractors to 147,000 feds and about 42,000 contractors by fiscal 2015. The first 4,100 of the new federal employees are expected to be hired through a competitive selection process during fiscal 2010.

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
