Airmen can file military pay electronically

There's a new option for filing military pay for Airmen whose orders are 29 days or less with mileage-only reimbursement.

The Tour of Duty Certification can be electronically filed using the AROWS-r program.

"The benefits of this new option are quicker payouts and no military pay paperwork to submit," said Mike Primo, 512th Military Pay chief. "You simply validate your order in AROWS, make any changes, e-certify and send to supervisor to e-certify."

In the TODC, it allows certification on the last day of the tour, and it has the unique ability to allow you to track the order in the AROWS-r program. For more information on this process, call Military Pay at (302) 677-3435.

We had the National Guard driving tanks down our blocks and smoke and debris could be seen coming from the city. Our town's volunteer fire company took more than half their trucks to the city as soon as the attacks were broadcasted on TV.
