## 512th Yellow Ribbon program gears up for fall events

ir Force reservists and their families have learned from years of experience that the rigors of a military deployment extend far beyond an Airman serving in theater.

From the time an Airman learns about an upcoming deployment to months after returning home, Airmen and their families deal with a myriad of issues. Reservists face unique issues not typically encountered by active duty deployers.

The Yellow Ribbon Reintegration Program has bridged the gap between active duty oriented deployment benefits and giving reservists and their families the information and assistance they need to take advantage of resources available to them.

brings together resources like finance, chaplains, legal, Military One Source, the USO, Military Family Life Consultants, and counselors and speakers to give reservists and guardsmen one-

stop shopping for the deployment needs of Airmen and Soldiers. Yellow Ribbon also offers age appropriate care and counseling for children from infants to teens.

Over the past year, the Yellow Ribbon program has eliminated its local events. opting to focus its resources on larger regional events. The quarterly cost-saving events are held once a month in resorts in each of the four Yellow Ribbon regions.

"I don't think people realize The Yellow Ribbon Program how useful it is, especially in

the pre-deployment phase, to go to one of the Yellow Ribbon events," said Tech. Sgt. Mariah Krass, 512th Airlift Wing Yellow Ribbon coordinator. "If they go during the pre-deployment

phase they can have a lot on their mind that they can deal with and also remember it for when they get back."

Yellow Ribbon events are no-cost to de-

ploying Airmen and their families and have more breakout sessions than a family can go to in just one trip. Many of the event breakouts are specific to phases of the deployment and vary between presenters.

She added that going to a pre-deployment event is a huge benefit in preparing families for the deployment cycle and just the beginning of the Yellow Ribbon program.

"If the whole family goes to a pre-deployment event then the family is more likely to attend while the person is deployed and stay connected with the resources that are out there," said Krass. "Then they will be looking forward to when the member comes home and going to events when they are home."

Deployers and their families are eligible for four events over the course of a deployment, which coincide with the life cycle of deployment.
