## Liberty Wing exceeds CFC goal

The 512th Airlift Wing exceeded its fundraising goal for the 50th Annual Combined Federal Campaign, which came to an end Nov. 10 here. The goal for the 1,700-person unit was \$13,500, and the wing donated \$983 more than that, tallying a 107 percent success rate.

The CFC is one of two Air Force-sponsored fundraisers federal employees can donate to on an annual basis. The CFC has thousands of local, national and international charities that provide health and human service benefits throughout the world.

"All of our group and squadron representatives did an outstanding job getting the word out," said Senior Master Sgt. James McGarvey, CFC project lead for the 512th AW. "A few representatives who stood out include Tech. Sgt. Teleah Adkins, Staff Sgt. Karista Laise and Senior Airman James Carlucci. They did an exceptional job garnering support for this year's drive."

Laise said she used various methods to ensure each member of her organization was aware of the opportunity to contribute to the CFC.

"I made myself available for a couple of the sign-out sessions," she said. "I used e-mail, briefed at commander's call and made a lot of office visits."

"I enjoyed doing my part for this worthy cause, and I've actually already asked to be the point of contact again for next year."

Other notable achievements include the 712th Aircraft Maintenance Squadron, which donated 198 percent of its monetary goal; and, the combined efforts of the 512th Operations Group and 512th Operations Support Flight enabled them to reach 158 percent of their goal.

The Liberty Wing's contributions played a part in Team Dover surpassing its base fundraising goal of \$180,000 by \$3,361.

Last year, federal employees pledged more than \$281.5 million to the world's largest workplace charity drive. While the campaign is over at Dover Air Force Base, Del., the CFC's active season continues until Dec. 15.
