A C-17 pilot and U.S. Air Force Academy graduate, Kozak served seven years in the regular Air Force, four years in the Air National Guard and 17 years as part of the Air Force Reserve Command.

The Liberty Wing consists of operations, maintenance and support groups, a medical squadron, and 15 units, of which one is a geographically separated unit at Langley Air Force Base, Va.
